MOTIONS

**26. Reconsideration of Outstanding Bills from Preceding Assembly:
Hon. Francis Ejiroghene Waive:**

- (i) *Federal polytechnics Act (Amendment) Bill, 2024 (HB.1977);*
- (ii) *Agricultural Research Council Nigeria Act (Amendment) Bill, 2024 (1978);*
- (iii) *Federal Polytechnics Act (Amendment) Bill, 2024 (HB 1815.); and*
- (iv) *Federal Medical Centres Act (Amendment) Bill, 2024 (HB. 1818).*

The House:

Notes that pursuant to Order Twelve, Rule 17 (a), (b), (c) & (d) of the Standing Orders, the House may, upon being re-gazetted or circulated, reconsider in the Committee of the Whole, without commencing de novo, the Bill(s)–

- (a) whose report was presented by the Committee before consideration;
- (b) passed by the House and forwarded to the Senate for concurrence for which no concurrence was made or negative;
- (c) passed by the Senate and forwarded to the House for which no concurrence was made or negative; or;
- (d) passed by the preceding Assembly and forwarded to the President for assent but for which assent or withholding therefore was not communicated before the end of the tenure of the preceding Assembly.

Also notes that the aforementioned Bills were passed by the preceding Assembly and forwarded to the President for assent but for which assent or withholding thereof was not communicated before the end of the tenure of the last Assembly;

Aware that the Bills were read for the first time as HBs. 1977, 1978, 1815, 1818, respectively;

Resolves to:

Re-commit the Bills to the Committee of the Whole for consideration.

**27. Ravaging Flood Disaster in Maiduguri and other Local Government Areas of Borno State:
Hon. Abubakar Hassan Fulata:**

The House:

Notes the recent flood disaster that submerged Maiduguri and environs as well as other neighboring Local Government Areas, causing unimaginable loss of lives, livestock, and property worth billions of naira;

Also notes that the flood disaster affected, among others, government institutions, including the Nigerian Arabic Language Village, which was originally located in Ngamburun Ngala but was forced to relocate to its Liaison Office in Maiduguri as a result of Boko Haram insurgency before this unfortunate incident occurred;

Aware that the Arabic Language Village, which is one of the four Inter-University Centers established by the Federal Government of Nigeria with the aim of offering Arabic and such other related courses to Nigerians by promoting Arabic Immersion services to undergraduates of Universities and Acculturation services to students from Colleges of Education;

Also aware that the Arabic Village fosters cooperation and ties with other countries, particularly in Arabic-speaking and cultural exhibitions, bridging language barriers in the Comity of Nations;

Disturbed that the flood submerged the Arabic Language Village, destroying computers, ICT appliances, books, journals, offices, library, furniture, and fittings. The Boko Haram insurgency complicated the situation. The center's strategic roles in immersion and acculturation programs have been suspended due to the flood;

Also disturbed that Students undergoing a one-year compulsory program in the Village will be stranded pending rehabilitation and replacement of damaged books, equipment, computers, and teaching aids for Arabic and academic activities;

Cognizant that the paucity of funds and the fact that the Borno State Government that has been assisting the village is itself in dire need of assistance in view of the fact that it is also overwhelmed by the flood disaster, hence, Craves Tor financial and all forms of assistance to ameliorate the sufferings of its citizens, thus can no longer render any assistance to the village;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the National Emergency Management Agency to immediately provide and distribute relief materials to the institution, students, and the staff affected by the flood;
- (ii) also urge the Hon. Ministers of Budget and National Planning, Federal Ministry of Education, Federal Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Finance, the Director General, Budget of the Federation, the Accountant General of the Federation, the National Emergency Management Agency; as well as the National Universities Commission, to:
 - (a) approve the immediate release of funds from the Service Wide Votes to the Nigeria Arabic Language Village for the procurement of all the potential and essential items required for the resumption of its operations and academic activities;
 - (b) include substantial amounts for the development of the permanent site of the Arabic Language Village in the 2025 budget as well as make provision for the maintenance and sustenance of the existing temporary site for full operation pending the completion and handover of the permanent site;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on University Education to investigate the level of damage and the requirements to put the institution back into operation and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

28. Need to Investigate the Alleged Mismanagement and Misapplication of 232 Million Dollars Equivalent to 350 Billion Naira Loan for Accelerating Nutrition Results in Nigeria (ANRiN) Program:

Hon. Chike John Okafor:

The House:

Notes the alleged mismanagement and misapplication of \$232 million in the Loan Intervention ANRiN Program in Nigeria;

Aware that the Accelerating Nutrition Results in Nigeria (ANRiN) is a World Bank-funded, performance-based project that uses loans to address nutritional challenges in Nigeria and to provide improved nutrition for vulnerable communities by increasing access to quality, cost-effective nutrition services for pregnant and lactating women, adolescent girls, and children under five years of age in the following 12 (twelve) selected states (Abia, Akwa Ibom, Gombe, Kaduna, Kano, Kogi, Kwara, Nasarawa, Niger, Oyo, and Plateau) from the six geopolitical zones:

Also aware that the ANRIN Program was entered into by the Federal Government in 2018 to achieve a balance between the urgent need to protect Nigerian children from the devastating and life-long effects of malnutrition with the expectation of improved nutritional interventions and outcomes before December 2024;

Concerned that the programs so far have been alleged to be “water, water everywhere but no water to drink,” a beautiful program for solving malnutrition challenges, but it has appeared to produce miraculous and obviously ineffective outcomes, taking cognizant of the reports and current indicators of Nigeria amidst such a huge and humongous loan from the World Bank.

Worried that the recently released Nigeria Demographic Health Survey 2023/2024 indicated a worsening of nutrition specifics with indices showing an increase in under -5 (five) stunting and malnutrition and the current realities raising question about the 232 million US dollars spent for nutritional interventions and Nigeria's poor global ranking;

Cognizant that an investigation will determine the extent of the alleged mismanagement of Funds in the ANRiN Program, evaluate its impact, identify responsible parties, and propose accountability measures for future \$50 million interventions.

Resolves to:

- (i) mandate the Committees on Nutrition and Food Security, Finance, Aids, Loan, and Debt Management to investigate the ANRiN World Bank loan to ensure that special programs of nutrition values are not abused or mismanaged;
- (ii) also mandate the Committees on Nutrition and Food Security, Finance, Aids, Loan, and Debt Management to invite the Federal Ministry of Health, National Primary Health Care Development Agency, World Bank, the twelve beneficiary States and other relevant stakeholders involved to provide necessary documents and insights on the program for ease of investigation and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

**29. Need to Revamp the Export Expansion Grant (EGF) by Nigerian Export Promotion Council:
Hon. Mukhtar Zakari Chawai:**

The House:

Aware that the EEG Scheme, administered by the Nigeria Export Promotion Council, aims to support active exporters, expanding their international trade through a post-shipment incentive by way of Export grants to encourage non-oil exports;

Also aware that such grants were used by eligible Nigerian companies as government promissory notes, tax credits, access to government bonds, etc. A viable intervention for trade businesses in the country;

Concerned that over time, owing to poor funding by the federal government, a huge number of EEG claims were not provided for. A provisional measure was introduced for the settlement of outstanding EEG claims through the Federal Government Promissory Note Programme (PNP). This was deployed to settle the claims in 3 batches: 2007-2016, 2017-2020, & 2021 to date;

Also concerned that the PNP Program has resulted in a massive and expanding national debt, with many grants still outstanding despite the 9th Assembly's intervention in ratifying the backlog of settlements;

Worried that many businesses have closed as a result of the lack of a significant plan to resolve the EEG claims of viable Nigerian companies, even as a temporary solution;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government and NEPC to immediately resume issuance of promissory notes to eligible companies from the 3 batches on record, namely 2007-2016, 2017-2020, and 2021 to 2024; and
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Commerce to look into revamping the settlement of all eligible Nigerian companies and report within 4 weeks.

**30. Irregular Disbursement of Basic Primary Healthcare Provision Funds (NPHCDA) by the National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA):
Hon. Adegboyega Adeyemi Adefarati:**

The House:

Notes the crucial role of the Basic Health Care Provision Fund (BHCPF) in enhancing access to Primary Health Care Services across Nigeria, especially in targeting vulnerable populations;

Also notes the irregular disbursement of Funds by the National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA) from 2021, with incomplete quarterly disbursements, which has impaired the functionality and sustainability of Primary Health Care Facilities;

Acknowledges the consequences of these discrepancies and the fact that many underserved rural communities rely on consistent funding to meet health care needs;

Also acknowledges the importance of maintaining accountability and transparency in the disbursement process to uphold the integrity of national health policies;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Health to immediately implement corrective measures to ensure regular and complete quarterly fund disbursements in line with BHCPF guidelines;
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Healthcare Services to:
 - (a) invite the leadership of the National Primary Health Care Development Agency to provide clarification on the irregular disbursement of Basic Health Care Provision Fund funds to the states, specifically addressing the shortfalls in disbursed quarters from 2021;
 - (b) investigate the impact of the irregularities on Primary Health Care Facilities, particularly how it affect service delivery and health outcomes in rural areas;
 - (c) examine and recommend measures to improve the operational efficiency and reliability of the NPHCDA's fund management practices and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

31. Revitalization of the Swine Research Institute, Okpuje-Nsukka:**Hon. Chidi Mark Obetta:****The House:**

Notes that the Swine Research Institute Okpuje-Nsukka was established in the early 1980s during the Shehu Shagari Administration to help drive livestock revolution in Nigeria;

Aware that Pig Farming is a lucrative industry characterized by high reproductive rates, efficient feed conversion, and a global demand for pork products;

Also aware that some of the largest pork producers in the world include 10 countries that dominate global production by utilizing traditional practices with modern technologies, using innovative new breeding techniques that improves quality of pork that meets both domestic and international standards;

Informed that from 2022 Exports records, the top exporters of pork were Spain (\$5.92 Billion), United States (\$5.38 Billion), Germany (\$3.8 Billion), Canada (\$2.97 Billion), and Denmark (\$2.89 Billion);

Also informed that Nigeria and Ghana consume over \$3 billion worth of pork products annually and 80% are imported;

Concerned that this 80% represents a huge demand gap in local production thereby increasing global demand for processed pork products like sausages, hot dogs, ham and bacon;

Worried that the Swine Research Institute, Okpuje-Nsukka responsible for training local farmers and driving innovation in the livestock sector geared towards earning foreign exchange through exportation of processed pork products, is facing financial difficulties due to lack of funding.

Cognizant that the revitalization of the Swine Research Institute, Okpuje-Nsukka will help in training local pig farmers and earn the country foreign exchange through exportation of processed pork products;

Resolves to:

- (i) mandate the Committees on Livestock and Appropriations to liaise with the Agricultural Research Council of Nigeria and the Federal Ministry of Livestock to provide funds in the 2025 Budget estimates for the revitalization of the Swine Research Institute Okpuje-Nsukka;
- (ii) mandate Committee on Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance.

32. Need for the Professional Disposal of Crude Oil and Associated Materials Recovered from Oil Thieves and Operators of Illegal Refineries, by the Operation Delta Safe Joint Task Force:**Hon. Marie Enenimiete Ebikake:****The House:**

Notes the alarming rise of crude oil theft and the operations of illegal refineries, predominantly in the Niger Delta region and the daily loss of billions of naira as a result of this obnoxious enterprise;

Also notes the news of the active participation of the very security personnel task with eradicating this economic sabotage;

Concerned that the standard practice of reintroducing seized crude to the environment, and the unprofessional incineration of vessels and illegal refineries, and seized crude oil cause further damage to a highly devastated ecosystem, and has proved ineffective as deterrence to crude oil theft and the operation of illegal refineries;

Worried that the combined effects of illegal refineries and oil theft, and the unprofessional disposal of crude oil and allied materials, by the Joint Task Force are directly contributing to the rising levels of toxicity of the Niger Delta environment which, in the view of environmental and health experts, is the primary cause of further depletion of the mangrove vegetation, poor crop harvests, the destruction of aquatic and other

marine lives, the rising cases of neo-natal mortality, liver and lungs poisoning, breathing difficulties, kidney damage, skin ulcers from acid rains, increased blood pressure and muscle weakness;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal government to halt environmental hostile practice for an eco-friendly and professional method of disposing crude oil and allied materials seized, in the course of security operations;
- (ii) also urge the security agents to include, in the Joint Task Force, environmental experts to supervise the disposal of seized crude which could, as well, be re-absorbed into the national oil stock, to minimize the incidents of crude oil spills and curb further pollution of the Niger Delta environment;
- (iii) mandate the National Assembly to consider an amendment of the Petroleum Industry Act (PIA), 2021 to mandate the oil companies to reserve a quota of employment opportunities for eligible indigenes of host communities, as this guarantee of economic security will, expectedly, make pipelines vandalism less attractive;
- (iv) also mandate the Committee on Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance.

CONSIDERATION OF REPORTS

33. A Bill for an Act to Amend the Nigeria Deposit Insurance Corporation Act, 2023 to make the Corporation more effective, ensure its Independence and Autonomy in line with Section 1(3) of the Principal Act, to bring it in line with Current Realities and Best Practices and for Related Matters (SB. 277) – *(Leader) (Hon. Julius Ihonvbere, Owan Federal Constituency) – Committee of the Whole: 11/12/2024.*
