Aware that the Committees are yet to present Reports on the Bills, contrary to the provisions of Order Eighteen, Rule 11 (5) of the Standing Orders of the House of Representatives, to wit:

“(5) any matter referred to a Committee shall be treated within 30 days; otherwise, the Committee shall stand discharged after 60 days except upon a motion for an extension of t time which shall not exceed fifteen days and the matter committed to the Committee of the Whole or any other Committee as the Speaker may decide from time to time.”

Resolves to:

discharge the above-mentioned Committees Bills referred to them and commit same to the Committee of the Whole.

11. Need for the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) to Remobilise to site and complete the Abandoned Obehie–Okeikpe–Akwete–Azumini Road project in the Ukwa West and Ukwa East Local Government Areas of Abia State:

Hon. Chris Nkwonta:

The House:

Notes the efforts of the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) in initiating infrastructural projects across the Niger Delta region, particularly the Obehie-Akwete-Azumini Road Project in the Ukwa West and Ukwa East Local Government Areas of Abia State, intended to improve connectivity, commerce and essential service access;

Concerned that the said road project has remained uncompleted and abandoned for an extended period, resulting in an unsafe stretch of road that has worsened transportation difficulties between the Okeikpe, Akwete and Azumini communities, causing road accidents, particularly on Saturday, October 11, 2025, where a trailer rammed into a lock-up shop, destroying goods worth millions of naira due to the bade state of the road. Thankfully for God, no life was lost;

Observes that portions of the road project which have already begun to fail before completion indicate poor quality of work and inadequate supervision, which fall short of the expected engineering and developmental standards mandated for NDDC projects;

Worried that the abandonment of the project has subjected the people of Ukwa West and Ukwa East to untold hardship, disrupting local trade and agriculture and limiting access to markets, schools, and healthcare facilities, further entrenching the economic marginalisation of the area;

Aware that NDDC is mandated to ensure proper supervision, quality assurance, and timely completion of all commissioned projects to guarantee sustainable impact across host communities;

Also aware that the people and local government authorities of Ukwa West and Ukwa East have made several representations to NDDC to address these issues, yet no concrete remedial action has been taken;

Resolves to:

- (i)* urge the Management of the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) to remobilise to the site to ensure the completion of the project, conduct a technical audit and independent site inspection of the said Road Project to access the quality of work done, determine causes of project stagnation, and recommend corrective measures and ensure strict compliance with approved engineering specifications and the use of standard materials for durable and sustainable road construction;
- (ii)* also urge the NDDC to collaborate with the Ukwa West and Ukwa East Local Government Councils in monitoring the continuation of the project to promote transparency, accountability, and community participation;
- (iii)* mandate the Committee on Niger Delta Development Commission to investigate the circumstances surrounding the poor quality and abandonment of the Road Project, particularly the Okeikpe-Akwete-Obohia-Azumini axis, and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

12. Need to Address the Spread of Buruli Ulcer Disease in Benue State:**Hon. Terseer Ugbor:****The House:**

Notes that Buruli Ulcer, an infectious disease locally referred to as 'Ambi', has silently ravaged communities in Benue State, particularly in Ushongo Local Government Area (LGA), and has spread across the State for over a decade;

Also notes that the disease was initially misunderstood as witchcraft, however Dr. Paul Orhi diagnosed the disease as Buruli Ulcer a bacterial infection requiring medical intervention rather than traditional or supernatural remedies;

Further notes that despite the availability of effective treatment methods, the disease, commonly known as 'Ambi', remains a threat to public health spreading at an alarming rate, causing widespread suffering, disability, and economic hardship;

Worried that the lack of adequate diagnostic and treatment facilities has exacerbated the crisis, necessitating urgent intervention by the Nigeria Centre for Disease Control (NCDC);

Aware that early diagnosis and appropriate antibiotic treatment can effectively cure Buruli Ulcer and prevent complications arising from late detection, such as avoidable amputations, social stigma, and substantial economic burdens on affected persons;

Concerned that the residents of Benue State can no longer endure the effects of Buruli Ulcer without proper medical intervention;

Also concerned that without a diagnostic center and laboratory close to the epicenter, samples have to be transported to Lagos for testing, resulting in false diagnosis;

Cognisant of the need to establish a Nigeria Centre for Disease Control Laboratory at the NKST Aku Comprehensive Health Centre and Cottage Hospital in Ikyobo, Ushongo Local Government Area, to diagnose, treat, and control Buruli Ulcer and other communicable diseases in the region;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Health and the Nigeria Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) to research the Buruli Ulcer disease and establish a well-equipped and functional laboratory in Ushongo Local Government Area, for the diagnosis and treatment of Buruli ulcer disease in Benue State and the country at large;
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Healthcare Services to ensure compliance and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

13. Need to Regulate Arbitrary Rent Increase and Protect Tenants from Exploitation:**Hon. Bassey Akiba:****The House:**

Notes that Section 14(2)(b) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) prioritizes the welfare of the people as the primary responsibility of government;

Also notes that housing has been universally accepted as the second most important basic need for human survival and an essential component of improving the quality of life for citizens. According to the United Nations Habitat Agenda, the provision of adequate housing that is safe, secure, accessible, affordable, and sanitary is a fundamental human right;

Aware that housing is crucial for national development and serves as an important source of capital formation, employment generation, and income production;

Concerned that the challenging economic climate is having a detrimental effect on individuals, households, and businesses, especially for those living in rental accommodations who are now grappling with escalating rents;

Also concerned that there is often a sudden surge in rent in areas after public infrastructure such as roads, markets, or other amenities are constructed evident in the Federal Capital Territory (FCT), where rent in areas with newly constructed roads has skyrocketed from ₦800,000 to as high as ₦2.5 million per annum, placing an unbearable financial burden on tenants;

Worried that the wanton exploitation by property owners undermines the government's intention to improve citizens' welfare through public infrastructure projects and drives Nigerians into hardship, forcing some to resort to crime to meet inflated demands;

Cognizant of the urgent need to balance the rights of property owners with the welfare of tenants to ensure fairness, stability, and sustainability in the housing sector;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government to prioritise investing in affordable housing initiatives, ensure access to low-cost housing for citizens and reducing pressure on the rental market;
- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Housing and Urban Development to collaborate with State Governments to enforce rent control measures, ensuring that public infrastructure projects do not lead to exploitative rent hikes, and cap rent increases at no more than 20% of the existing rent, irrespective of infrastructure improvements or other factors; and
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Housing and Habitat to ensure compliance and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

14. Need to Commend the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) on Recovery of Proceeds of Crime:

Hon. Nnamdi Ezechi:

The House:

Notes that the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) was established to address growing public concerns about the destructive impact of economic and financial crimes in Nigeria;

Also notes that despite facing challenges such as politicization, selective prosecution, limited funding, and the complexity of financial crimes, the EFCC has continued to adapt and implement innovative strategies to fulfill its mandate effectively;

Aware that the EFCC has achieved remarkable milestones which includes:

- (a) Securing 4,111 convictions in 2024, the highest number in a single year since its inception;
- (b) Recovering over N364.6 billion, approximately \$214.5 million, and other significant sums in foreign currencies in 2024;
- (c) Successfully gathering and analyzing financial intelligence, disrupting financial crimes like money laundering and terrorist financing, and recovering billions of naira in stolen funds and assets, boosting the national economy and public trust;
- (d) Raising public awareness about financial crimes, emphasizing integrity in public office, and educating citizens on the dangers of corruption;

Recognise the exceptional patriotic efforts demonstrated by the EFCC which increases motivation, boosts morale, and encourages continued excellence;

Resolves to:

formally commend the Chairman, officers, and personnel of the EFCC for their unwavering commitment to combating economic and financial crimes in Nigeria and ensure adequate and timely funding of the EFCC to discharge its mandate effectively.
