MOTIONS

11. **Need to Operationalise and Complete National Automotive Development Projects in Sokoto State:**

Hon. Abdussamad Dasuki:

The House:

Notes that the National Automotive Design and Development Council (NADDC), established by Act No. 83 of 2014 under the Federal Ministry of Industry, Trade and Investment, is mandated to drive the development of Nigeria's Automotive Industry through the implementation of the National Automotive Industry Development Plan (NAIDP);

Also notes that in furtherance of its mandate, NADDC established Automotive Service Hubs across the country, including those in Dogondaji town and Bodinga in Sokoto State, to enhance vehicle diagnostics, maintenance, component testing, skills development, and job creation;

Aware that the Bodinga Automotive Service Hub, Sokoto State was completed, fully equipped, and handed over to the Federal Government in March, 2023 at a cost of over one billion naira, however, the facility has remained non-operational since its commissioning;

Concerned that the abandonment of this critical national asset, undermines the objectives and policy on industrialisation, youth empowerment, and economic diversification of the National Automotive Industry Development Plan, denies citizens access to economic opportunities, and constitutes a waste of public funds;

Also concerned that the Dogondaji Automotive Youth Training Centre in Sokoto State, designed to complement the Service Hub through skills acquisition, has been abandoned at the construction stage despite significant public investment;

Worried that the non-utilisation of these projects may deteriorate the infrastructures, thereby, resulting in loss of economic value, and erode public confidence in government initiatives;

Cognizant of the strategic importance of functional automotive infrastructure in enhancing technical capacity, promoting standards, supporting local industries, and creating sustainable employment opportunities;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Industry, Trade and Investment and the National Automotive Design and Development Council (NADDC) to:
 - (a) ensure the immediate completion and full execution of the Dogondaji Automotive Youth Training Centre, Sokoto State;
 - (b) prioritise the effective utilisation, proper management and maintenance of completed public infrastructure to prevent waste of public funds;
 - (c) call on relevant stakeholders to ensure that youths, artisans, and automotive service providers in Sokoto State derive maximum benefit from these facilities upon full operation;

- (ii) also urge the National Automotive Design and Development Council (NADDC) to immediately operationalise the Bodinga Automotive Service Hub, Sokoto State for the benefit of the people;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Commerce to visit Bodinga Automotive Service Hub and the Dogondaji Automotive Youth Training Centre to ascertain their current status, investigate the cause of delay in operation and abandonment, and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.
